

TIN SITTING WITCH

Materials


Leather work gloves
6' of 8" wide roof flashing
Tin snips
A hammer and nail
fine=grit sandpaper
Hot glue
White matte spray paint
Acrylic paints
Embellishments such as feathers,
perle cotton, buttons, pipe cleaners, bead trim foam stamps

Directions

- 1. Cut out and tape together as directed on the patterns
- 2. Lay clean roof flashing out flat and tape all patterns to flashing. Caution: Tin snips and flashing edges are sharp. Wear work gloves for this project. Cut out witches dresses and pumpkins.
- 3. Make small holes, where indicated on pattern, using a hammer and nail. Sand entire surface of all pieces with fine grit sandpaper. Spray paint all parts matte white on both sides. Hot glue arms to back of body. Paint witch, dresses and pumpkins, as you desire, When dry, embellish by painting patterns, gluing bead trim to dresses, etc.



- 4. Refer to the pattern to bend the witch into sitting position.. Bend the hand to hold the purse.
- 5. Gently arch the dress by hand. Hang dress around her neck by sliding pipe cleaners through the holes at the top of her dress. make pom-poms on her shoes with pipe cleaners.
- 6. String fiber through pumpkin to make handle, knotting in the back. Hang it on her hand and welcome her in your favorite room.



The History of Halloween by Justina Carubia

Halloween is a spook-tacular fun filled holiday! There's the trick-or-treating, the pumpkin carving, leaving jack-o-lanterns on your doorstep, putting together your costume, and toilet papering your neighbor's (or even your own) house on mischief night! These are the most fun activities of Halloween, and many of us go through the motions each year...but do we really stop and think where all of these traditions come from?

Halloween dates back to Ireland about 2,000 years ago, when the Celts would have festivals to celebrate their new year. The festival, known as Samhain (pronounced So-win), marked the end of summer, the beginning of the fall harvest, and the coming of the cold winter, which was associated with human death. They celebrated this festival on October 31, which was the night they believed the ghosts of the dead would come back to Earth to raise havoc and ruin crops. During the celebration, the Celts would wear costumes of animal heads and skins in order to ward away the evil spirits. They would also leave their homes after dark and place bowls of food outside to prevent the spirits from wanting to enter.

Trick-or-treating dates back to England's All Soul's Day parades. During this celebration, poor citizens begged for food. Families gave them "soul cake" pastries in exchange for promises to pray for their family's dead loved ones. The church encouraged this and eventually children took the tradition.

By the second half of the 19th century, Immigrants who flooded into America due to the Potato Famine, helped to nationally popularize the folklore and traditions of what is now known as Halloween.

History of the Jack-o-lantern

People have been making Jack O'Lanterns for centuries! It all originated from an Irish myth about a man named "Stingy Jack". It is said that Stingy Jack had invited the Devil to have a drink with him, but did not want to pay for it. He talked the Devil into turning himself into a coin so that Jack could pay for his drink with it. The Devil did so, and instead of buying the drink, Jack placed the coin in his pocket along side of a silver cross. This prevented the Devil from turning back to his true form. Jack bribed the devil to not bother him for one year. He also convinced the Devil to not take his soul if he died. The Devil agreed to this, and was eventually set free to his original form. A year passed, and the Devil came back. This time, Jack fooled him by climbing into a tree to pick a piece of fruit. The Devil followed him in the tree, and when Jack got out of the tree he carved the sign of the cross into the tree bark. The Devil could not come down until he agreed to not bother Jack for another 10 years. During that time, Jack died. God would not let such a selfish jester into Heaven, and The Devil had sworn to not take Jack's soul into hell, so he sent Jack into the dark night with nothing but a burning coal to light his way. Jack put the lit coal into a turnip and used it as a lantern and he roamed the Earth ever since. The Irish referred to his ghost as Jack of the Lantern. It was eventually shortened to Jack O'Lantern. The Irish, Scottish, and English would carve evil faces into turnips, beets, and potatoes and place them on their porches to scare away the spirit of Stingy Jack. When they immigrated to America, they would eventually start using pumpkins.

Pumpkin Carving 101

YOU WILL NEED

- A Pumpkin
- -Three tools*: poker, drill, saw
- -Tape
- -Candle
- -Paper pattern: make one or google pumpkin patterns and print one out

* You can use everyday kitchen and workshop tools, or buy pumpkin-carving tools at variety

ASK AN ADULT for permission to use sharp tools and lighted candles or get an adult to help you work.

HERE'S HOW



1. CUT AN OPENING in the top or bottom of a pumpkin. Make the hole big enough so that you can clean out the pumpkin easily. Save the piece you cut out to use as a lid.



2. CLEAN AND SCRAPE THE INSIDE. The pumpkin wall you will carve should be no more than one inch thick



3. CUT OUT THE PATTERN or make your own out of a piece of paper. Trim the pattern and tape it to the pumpkin. It may be necessary to make small folds to fit the paper smoothly.



4. TRANSFER THE DESIGN. Using the poker, poke through the paper making dots along each outline on the pattern. Then remove the pattern. (Save it and refer to it while you are carving.)



5. DRILL THE HOLES. Hold the pumpkin in your lap and twist the drill into each hole made by the poker in step 4. Turn the drill gently until it pierces the pumpkin's skin.



6. START SAWING. Grasp the saw like a pencil and move it steadily up and down, working from dot to dot. Always hold the saw at a right angle to the pumpkin.



7. CUT A CHIMNEY. Light a candle inside the pumpkin, then close the lid. Quickly put out the flame and look for the blacken spot inside the lid. Cut a small hole there; it will let the smoke and heat escape while a candle glows inside.







Measuring spoons Bowl

Ingredients

2-1/2 Tablespoons water 60-70 drops of red food coloring 10-15 drops yellow food coloring 2-3 drops blue food coloring 5-1/2 Tablespoons white corn syrup

Directions

- 1. Mix all of the food colorings and water together.
- 2. Slowly stir in the corn syrup until the mixture is thick, but still "slides" down your arm. (This goop will stain your clothing, so don't wear the good stuff!)
- 3. Smear it on your skin wherever you want the "blood" to be.

No Equipment needed for this...

Ingredients

Whole peppercorns white or black Corn syrup or eyelash glue Hair bristles from a paintbrush or out of your hair (Optional) Non-toxic watercolors (the kind you

use in grade school)

- 1. Glue peppercorns to your hands or face using the corn syrup or eyelash glue. KEEP PEPPER-**CORNS AWAY FROM YOUR EYES! You may have** to hold them in place until the glue or syrup is dry.
- 2. Dip one end of the hairs in the glue or syrup and attach to the peppercorn, so they look hairy.
- 3. Use the paints to color them creepy!

CAUTION! Some of these WILL STAIN some clothes. All will wash off your skin with soap and water. Happy Halloween and Great Ghouling!

Equipment

Two paintbrushes Small saucepan (if using a microwave, you will need a glass 1-cup measuring cup)

Ingredients

Cornmeal Corn syrup Red or brown water colors or makeup blush or rouge One envelope unflavored gelatin, like Knox brand.

- 1. In a small saucepan, sprinkle gelatin over 1/4 cup of cold water. Let stand one minute. Then stir over low heat until all of the gelatin is completely dissolved. (Microwave Directions: In a 1-cup glass measuring cup, sprinkle one envelope gelatin over 1/4 cup of cold water, let stand 2 minutes. Microwave on HIGH (Full power) for 40 seconds, stir well, then let stand 2 more minutes until gelatin is completely dissolved. Let it cool completely before using!)
- 2. Paint or smear a thin coat of corn syrup on your skin the shape you want your scabs to be.
- 3. Cover the syrup with a thick layer of cornmeal. Let it sit for 2 minutes, then carefully tap off the excess.
- 4. Use the paints or makeup to color the cornmeal patches.
- 5. With a paintbrush, paint the COOLED gelatin mixture over and around the scab. Do this VERY GENTLY so you don't brush off the cornmeal. (The gelatin "seals" it in place).

Mom's Pumpkin Pie

"This is the pumpkin pie that my mother has made for years. It is a rich pie with just the right amount of spices."

PREP TIME 30 Min
COOK TIME 1 Hr
READY IN 1 Hr 30 Min
SERVINGS & SCALING
Original recipe yield: 1 - 9 inch

Original recipe yield: 1 - 9 inch pie - Serves 8

INGREDIENTS

1 recipe pastry for a 9 inch single crust pie

3 eggs

1 egg yolk

1/2 cup white sugar

1/2 cup packed brown sugar

1 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg

1/2 teaspoon ground ginger

1/4 teaspoon ground cloves

1 1/2 cups milk

1/2 cup heavy whipping cream

2 cups pumpkin puree

DIRECTIONS

1. Preheat oven to 425 degrees F (220 degrees C.)

2. In a large bowl, combine eggs, egg yolk, white sugar and brown sugar. Add salt, cinnamon, nutmeg, ginger and cloves. Gradually stir in milk and cream. Stir in pumpkin. Pour filling into pie shell.

3. Bake for ten minutes in preheated oven. Reduce heat to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C), and bake for an additional 40 to 45 minutes, or until filling is

"DEVILED" EGGS

Recipe Ingredients

6 eggs

3 Thsp. Miracle Whip or low-fat mayo

1 tsp. prepared mustard

1 tsp. vinegar

1/4 tsp. salt or salt substitute

1/8 tsp. pepper

Paprika

1 Red Sweet Pepper

Put eggs into large saucepan. Add cold water to cover the eggs. Bring to boil. Turn heat to low and cook for 20 minutes. Run cold water over done eggs. Peel eggs under cold running water. Cut each egg lengthwise in half. Remove yolks and put in bowl. Add Miracle whip, mustard, vinegar, salt and pepper. Spoon mixture into egg whites. Sprinkle with paprika.

Cut a slice of the Red Bell Pepper. Cut into the slice diagnally to make small triangles. Stick 2 triangles into each egg to create devil ears.

THE ALMOST FAMOUS PLAYER'S

Haunted Woods Tour

with Patricia Abbott

AZ: Tell us a little bit about the AFP and what they are all about?

PA: It's about a love of performing and the chance to share this with others. I truly believe that the performing arts teach confidence, teamwork and much more. I believe that by exposing children to performing arts at a young age, they will be more likely to remain involved throughout their school years and beyond. We also believe in sharing our talents and providing community service when we can (performances at the local library, NJ Foster Care Association Holiday Party, Chandlers Theater in Bridgewater, NJ Renaissance Kingdom, ST. Peter's Hospital Cancer Survivor's Day Picnic). It's very rewarding to see these people smile!

AZ: How did starting this organization, come about? PA: I have over 30 years of theater experience ranging from acting & scripting, to directing. I guess the roots of AFP began when I was persuaded to start a drama club at my son's grade school. Now mind you he was in 1st grade and is now 21. The school presented me with 50 children, which was way too many for one person to handle. I managed to get help from Summer Drama Workshop students and young college students. It was wonderful; I had found a group of talented teenagers who willingly volunteered time to share their knowledge and love of theater with the younger students. The excitement between the teen teachers and young students could only be described as "explosive"! ALMOST FAMOUS PLAYERS was born...

AZ: How long after you started AFP, did you come up with the idea for a Haunted Woods tour?

PA: Over ten years is my best guess. The young students who volunteered were now in high school, but still wanted to remain a part of AFP. Finding a hall or theater we could afford was way beyond our non-existent budget, so I hit on the idea of an outdoor Halloween show. After much searching, we found the perfect spot in Putnam Park, So. Plfd. It was modeled after the very successful Haunted Village in Somerset. I approached the Mayor at the time, Dan Gallagher and he and the council gave us the go ahead. I approached the Mayor at the time, Dan Gallagher and he and the council gave us the go ahead. We lucked out in finding a tech genius, Mr. Danny Nigro, who just happened to live 3 doors from the park.



AZ: What kinds of spooky things can we expect from the tour this year?

PA: The show will be a bit darker, but will retain some of the comedy we are known for. Expect more deadly creatures and sudden scares.

AZ: Every year, you have some sort of theme going on. What is the theme going to be this year?

PA: This year will take the audience back to the days of brave medieval knights, a fairy princess, and a few very evil creatures in the Cursed Forest of the Putnam Kingdom. The scares are everywhere. Last year's twist of two different sets of Tour Guides was a big hit. We will attempt to create that again.

AZ: How many scenes/stops do you have on the tour? PA: The show is slated to start outside the woods with a big celebration. Other than that I hope to have only 4 stops. As I noted, LOTS of sudden scares will happen, as people are moving.

AZ: What kinds of special effects do you use in your show?

PA: Right now we use fog and lightening machines. Spider webs and tons of rats are wonderful. The rest of the props are unfortunately out of our price range right now.

AZ: How do you power some of your electric involved scenes?

A: Our Tech god Danny Nigro placed household sized generators in the woods. We also have a control board so that he doesn't have to run all over to turn on lights etc. We also have a fabulous running crew to keep things on schedule.

AZ: What's your favorite scene out of all of the past tours you have done?

PA: Now that's a hard one! I liked the old lady in the rocking chair, the "RING" scene, and the Mad Scientist. Another favorite was the very first year when a body fell from a rope in a tree and landed just over the heads of the tour guides. How we LOVED the screams!

AZ: Where will the tour be held, and when can we expect to come see the madness?

PA: You can join the fun at Putnam Park, South Plainfield, NJ from October 25-28. Tours start at about 6:30 pm and run till 10 pm, but sometimes much later depending on the crowds!

AZ: What would you say differs your haunted tour from all the others that seem to pop up around Hallow-een?

PA: A lot of things! People don't seem to understand that it is an OUTDOOR show, the action happens around you. For 20-30 minutes you will be transported out of your normal world. One year we took the audience to old World Transylvania! Our FEES are more than generous: \$6 for adults and \$4 for Children. Occasionally on the final night we raise the price by \$1, but where else can you take a family of 4 for \$20 worth of entertainment? We have the full approval of the Mayor and Council as well as that of an Assemblyman. Most importantly we do NOT allow the cast members to ever touch an audience member.

AZ: What is the target audience of the tour; is it too scary for young children?

PA: That's hard to answer... I recommend the show for 8 and up, but we've had parents bring kids in strollers. I have had 4 year olds laugh at me and 12 year olds run out crying. We've had grown men leave and a woman got a tad sick from our Cannibals scene. Parents have to know their own kids and how they react to scares. Anyone at all can get afraid when someone jumps out at you or there is a sudden loud sound!

AZ: Tell us a little bit about your cast!

PA: The cast ranges from 26-49, it looks like a huge cast this year. We have a number of new kids coming up from Grant School, as well as Middle School. High School students are the bulk of the cast, but there are also many college students and a hand full of adults. Regulars include my son, Christoper Abbott, who helped me create the show 5 years ago, Lisa Flammer, Shannen Rivers, Angelica Keller, Rocco Severini and several more. It can be a lot of work dealing with so many levels of talent.

AZ: How far in advance do you start planning the storyline for each year's tour, and when do you start rehearsals?

PA: Ideas for storylines begin anytime after the show. I usually try to get serious after New Years, but it often takes months to go from a simple idea to a real script. Each year we plan to start early, but Summer Drama and things like vacations always slow us down. There is always the matter of fundraising too. We like to give back to the community not just by performing, but also by donating funds to the Fire Dept and Rescue Squad. Rehearsals actually began September 8.



AZ: Where do you draw your inspiration from when writing the scripts?

PA: I get ideas from TV, movies, or just something someone says. Then I elaborate on it!

AZ: How can one get involved with the Haunted Woods Tour or just AFP in general?

PA: They only need to call us at (908) 346-2290 or see the webpages...

AZ: Tell us one thing nobody knows about the AFP Haunted Woods Tour!

PA: I am very proud of all the people who pass through the show over the years. Halloween is my favorite time of year, the most fun is finding new and different props to use each year, the trick is to find ones I can afford! Any and ALL donations are graciously accepted.

AZ: What is your favorite scary movie and why?

PA: I don't think I have one scary movie, my grandmother used to watch Creature Features with us when my parents when out late. She would make popcorn, then we'd turn out the lights and have fun being scared. Candyman did keep me awake for a night though!


